

ARMY ATTACHMENT CAMP

Senior Under Officer Mishel Verma attended a 12-day Army Attachment Camp (ATTC) organised by the 21 Rajput Battalion at Mamun Camp, Pathankot, from 27th October to 7th November 2025.
